THE DIRECTOR'S CUT

Last Year in Review

What a year 2023 turned out to be. I am in awe of how much ORHS accomplishes for such a small but mighty group. The

Food Distribution program wrapped up 2023 by giving out over 50k pounds of food in, a 51% growth from 2022. This program helped families to keep their pets instead of having to surrender them to shelters and rescues due to family food instability.

Our Community Spay/neuter program saw equal growth and success with a 50% increase with 610 cats and 184 dogs altered over the course of the year. The breakdown of those numbers showed us 442 of them were owned pets and 135 were community cats. For those of you who may not be familiar with the term, community cats are living in outside groups, often referred to as feral cats. A member of the community serves as a caretaker for the group, ensuring they have food, water, and maintain the growth of the population through spay/

An additional program ORHS has not significantly engaged in recently was TNR (trap, neuter or spay, return). The difference between this program and community cat surgeries is the full service being provided by ORHS volunteers who set up the traps, pick up the trapped cats, transport them for surgery then return them to the colony following

Facing challenges such as parvo and ringworm, as well as the current national trend of more animals entering shelters and staying longer, prevented the kind of growth we want through our adoption program, but the program was not without highpoints. Both the cat and dog programs adopted out a number of our long-term residents. On the cat side were Gracie after 11 years, Lucy 6 years, Sweetie 11 years, Susie 11 years, and Diamond 1 ½ years. On the dog side, Bruno Mars - 266 days, Putter - 137 days, Mulligan – 189 days, Birdie – 207 days, Pepper – 112 days, Charlie – 169 days, Fiji – 271 days, and Sterling - 124 days.





Registration can be done through the QR code on our flyer or by visiting atlantahumane.org/catworkshop.


