### Pets Love Vets Celebrates 5 Years of Providing Free Pet Adoption to Military Veterans

In 2018, the Rotary Club of Greene and Putnam Counties launched Pets Love Vets as a free shelter pet adoption program for U.S. military Veterans. Studies of human blood chemistry show a significant reduction in stress-related hormones when people interact with animals. These positive physiological effects can occur in as little as 5 to 24 minutes, which is faster than medication for stress. Pets Love Vets was a project designed to increase the quality of life for all U.S. Military Veterans, including those who may be struggling with PTSD and/or other service-related illness or injury.

Pets Love Vets has been a resounding success. To date, 131 shelter animals have been adopted by Veterans and their families; however, Veterans can only take advantage of the program if they know it exists. Consequently, The Rotary Club is always looking for help in raising awareness of the program within the military Veteran community.

The Pets Love Vets program has had a profound impact on central Georgia's Veteran community. Pets Love Vets helps once-troubled Veterans achieve a measure of peace and tranquility in their lives; the unconditional love and acceptance that a companion pet offers have instantaneous benefits for the Veteran, and the Rotary Club if thrilled to partner in such an important project. Debbie Zaiger hates going to the dentist. She puts off her appointments as long as she can. "My level of anxiety at the dentist is really high — so much so that I need laughing gas just to get my teeth cleaned," she said. Then last month, she learned about Ollie. When Zaiger, 61, showed up for her hygiene appointment in downtown Minneapolis, she reclined in the dentist's chair and Ollie, a fluffy, 80-pound English goldendoodle, hopped into her lap and sprawled across her legs.

Zaiger said she was able to relax, this time without nitrous oxide. "While my teeth were being cleaned, I was petting Ollie and rubbing his head and ears, and he fell asleep on top of me," she said. "He's such a good boy, and he was really calming. I'm surprised at how much he helped."

Ollie belongs to hygienist April Kline. She started bringing the sweet-natured 4-year-old canine to work with her at J & D Dental from time to time last year, thinking he might help comfort nervous patients. "Dentistry isn't an easy profession — nobody tells us that coming here is the best day of their life," she said. "Having Ollie here has been a game changer. He brightens everyone's day and he's become a huge hit."

Studies have shown that petting dogs can relax people and reduce stress, and also that dogs benefit from the interaction as well. About 36 percent of Americans have <u>dentophobia</u> — a fear of going to the dentist, with 12 percent having an extreme fear, according to the Cleveland Clinic.

### **DID YOU KNOW... ABOUT FIP?**

In August 2021 Dreama lost her cat Max to FIP. On a Friday evening he wasn't his playful, fun-loving self and had stopped eating. Dreama took him to the vet first thing Monday morning, where, after ruling out other medical issues, they determined he had FIP. By the end of the week, Dreama had to make the difficult decision to say goodbye to Max. She was devastated! Now we have lost our precious Fig as well.

This horrible disease also affected Yogi, adopted by Sharon Gabrielli, Petey, adopted by Barbara Funke and Gracie, adopted by Sue Rinker. Fortunately they were diagnosed early enough to receive treatment and after a long, roller coaster ride for all of them they are each currently doing well.

What is FIP? It is a fatal infection and a leading cause of death in young cats for which no effective preventive or treatment is available. FIP is a very difficult disease to deal with because there are no clinical signs that are specific for the diagnosis of FIP, and no simple blood test to confirm a diagnosis.

What are the signs of FIP? With Effusive, or "wet" FIP, the clinical sign is the accumulation of fluid within the abdomen or chest which can cause breathing difficulties. Other symptoms include lack of appetite, fever, weight loss jaundice and diarrhea. Non-effusive, or "dry" FIP also presents with these symptoms but there is usually not an accumulation of fluid. Typically, a cat with dry FIP will show ocular or neurological signs like difficulty in standing or walking with functional paralysis developing over time. Loss of vision is another possible outcome.

What is the treatment for FIP? There have been significant recent developments in the management of this once fatal condition. Hope came in 2020-2021, when several new anti-viral drugs became legally available initially in Australia, then the UK and now via export to multiple countries around the world. Experience using these drugs has shown that most cats can be successfully treated (response is around 85%). The treatment course is long at 84 days, and most cats can be treated at home with tablets/liquid, but if very unwell, they may require the initial treatment in the veterinary clinic with injectable anti-viral drugs.
